A Passover Faith in an Egyptian World Exodus 12:3, 5-8, 11-13, 19-20

Egypt is a picture of the world system.

- Egypt is a place where everyone is a <u>slave</u>, but almost no one knows it.
- Egypt is a place where God's <u>authority</u> is denied and mankind pretends that he is powerful.
- Egypt is a place where spiritual stubbornness results in the <u>judgement</u> of God.

Passover is a picture of the salvation of God.

- Passover points us to the fact that we need someone from outside of ourselves to <u>deliver</u> us from our sin.
- Passover acknowledges that God is <u>sovereign</u> and the only proper response to His authority is our submission.
- Passover is a picture of the substitutionary <u>sacrifice</u> that takes away our sin and places God's punishment on Jesus.

The Feast of Unleavened Bread is a picture of the **Christian life**.

- Just as the Passover is a picture of our salvation, the Feast of Unleavened Bread is a picture of our sanctification.
- Leaven represents sin in the Bible. So, the Feast of Unleavened Bread symbolizes overcoming sin.
- It is one thing to get Israel out of Egypt; it is altogether another thing to get Egypt out of <u>Israel</u>!
